What should I already know?

- The town I live in is called St. Helens, which is in Merseyside. There are villages, towns and cities in Merseyside, some of which are **coastal**. Liverpool is a city in Merseyside. It is close to St Helens.
- Merseyside is a county in England, which is a country. England is part of Great Britain (England, Scotland and Wales) and the United Kingdom (U.K.) is made up of Great Britain and Northern Ireland is in the **continent** of Europe.
- The seven **continents** (Europe, Africa, North America, South America, Asia, Australasia and Antarctica) and five oceans (Pacific, Atlantic, Indian, Southern and Arctic).

The United States is in the **continent** of North America. It is bounded to the north by Canada to the west by the Pacific Ocean, to the south by Mexico, and to the east by the Atlantic Ocean. It is in the Northern Hemisphere.

50 States make up this large country. Some are well populated, others are more rural.

The **Missouri** river is the longest river in North America whilst **Denali mountain** (Alaska) is its highest peak.

New York state is on the east coast, its major metropolis is New York city which is also known as the Big Apple. There are two major rivers in New York City: the Hudson and the East River.

The climate is mostly **temperate**, but some states have are warmer (tropical climate) and others colder (an Arctic climate).

The USA is so large that it has different time zones.
